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**TEACHING IN ARIZONA MAKING FILM FESTIVAL PREMIERE AT
2019 PHOENIX FILM FESTIVAL**

TUCSON, Ariz. — Tucson Values Teachers' documentary short film, TEACHING IN ARIZONA, is making its film festival premiere at the 2019 Phoenix Film Festival. The film will be featured in the shorts program during the Festival, which will be held April 4-14 at Harkins Scottsdale 101 in Phoenix. The Phoenix Film Festival is the state's largest film festival and attracts more than 27,000 attendees every year.

TEACHING IN ARIZONA, produced by Tucson Values Teachers, follows three Southern Arizona teachers to deliver an intimate portrait of what it's really like to be a teacher today. Filmmaker Lisa Molomot spent eight months in 2018 following the teachers, documenting the realities of teaching. Teachers featured in the film include:

- Tia Lei Tsosie-Begay, 4th grade teacher at Los Niños Elementary School in Sunnyside Unified School District;
- Nathaniel Rios, history and government teacher at Flowing Wells High School in Flowing Wells Unified School District; and
- Janet Acree, math specialist at AmeriSchools Academy of Tucson.

Screenings of TEACHING IN ARIZONA have been held across the state since its premiere on Sept. 20, 2018 at the Tucson Convention Center as part of Tucson Values Teachers' Let's Talk Ed event. A list of upcoming screenings, along with information on how the public can request to host their own local screening, is available at the film's official website. The next screening of the film is scheduled for March 28 in Tucson and is co-hosted with CITY Center for Collaborative Learning.
